

Nationally, Nevada is the 4th least affordable state for infant care in licensed family child care and the 8th least affordable in licensed centers. The price of infant care represents 61% of income for a family of three living at 100% of poverty, and 23% of income for a family of three who makes just one dollar more than the cut off for child care subsidy assistance. In federal fiscal year 2021, Nevada's Child Care Subsidy Program served about 5.5% of children living under 200% of the federal poverty level.







Nevada's Quality Rating Improvement System (QRIS) is a continuous improvement system available to licensed child care and district Pre-K programs. In August 2022, 61% of licensed centers, 29% of family child care, and 100% of district Pre-K classrooms participated in QRIS.


