When individuals become dislocated workers as a result of job loss, mass layoffs, plant trade closures, or transition in economic sectors, the Dislocated Worker program provides services to assist them in re-entering the workforce. Services for dislocated workers are integrated and provided through existing network of American Job Centers (AJCs). The AJCs provide significant resources to assist employment workforce education, training, and employment program, and help dislocated workers. WIOA, Title I, Youth	A comprehensive youth employment program for serving eligible youth, ages 14-24, who face barriers to education, training, and employment. Funds for youth services are allocated to states and local areas based on a formula. The WIOA Youth Program focuses primarily on out-of-school youth, requiring local areas to equal a minimum of 75% of WIOA youth funds on them. This program includes 4 program elements that are required to be made available to youth participants: WIOA promotes work experience through a 20% minimum expenditure rate for the work experience program/element. Local programs provide youth services in partnership with American Job Centers and under the direction of local Workforce Development Boards.
